The Sermon

The Reverend Cheryl Harder

With music in my heart and your love in my soul, let me share your words O Lord. AMEN

I love music – so much of my life is surrounded by it. As a 50 year old, I was the youngest of all the people marching with Mr Moody's marching band, yesterday I played with ____other tuba/euphonium players at Tuba Christmas – (If you missed it – you can utube Tuba Christmas – Tulsa) . I spend most Sundays singing along with the choir. I would rather listen to music than to watch tv. God speaks to me through song and I answer the same way. The song that kept running through my head when I prepared for this sermon was this.. "Be still and know that I am God: Be still and know that I am God – be still and know that I am God."

Be still.....in this season of anything BUT stillness – God asks us to be still and listen. God asked that of Mary and Elizabeth some 2000 years ago, and thankfully they were still and listened.

I promised myself and God that I would not rush Christmas this year. My husband Ron and I have been waiting to get into our new house since October – we closed on Wednesday, and are moving things in, My house does NOT look like Christmas Today is the 4th Sunday in Advent and I vowed that I would both revel in that and in the hope and promise of our future. You will notice that we will not be singing any Christmas Hymns this morning - It is the 4th Sunday in Advent and we are still waiting .

We have been inundated – it seems like more so this year than in past ones with the Christmas season being moved up. I know that several stores began their Christmas season in late September !!! The “after Christmas” deals – you know 70% off have been out for a couple of weeks. Hallmark has all of it’s Christmas movies playing = ad nauseum. And some radio stations have been playing nonstop Christmas music since before Thanksgiving.

Now for the next couple Sundays when we actually play and sing Christmas music here at church (because it IS the season) people will wonder why we are playing them AFTER Christmas. We get *tired* of Christmas even before it is here.

So today... let us enjoy the last Sunday of Advent. Let us sing with our hearts and with our souls about the love of our Lord. Let us be still. For today-forget about Christmas shopping, or wrapping presents or baking. Today – forget about Christmas it will come in its time whether we are ready or not. Today – be still - live for today- Let your job today be to listen for the signs and signals – signals that Mary and Elizabeth heard and felt over 2000 years ago. I will challenge each of you to take these few days before “Santa” and listen to the small voice that tells us what Christmas is really about. It is not about tinsel or the glitz that our society wants us to believe that it is about. *Whisper...* It’s about Jesus

I think that God wants to do to us, to each of us this Christmas, exactly what God did for Mary and Elizabeth. God wants to put into our hearts, and into our lives, hope and joy. Real hope -- the kind that isn't for sale and doesn't wear out; and real joy -- the joy that begins deep inside. And God wants each of us, like Mary, to bear within us, and to carry to those around us, the Lord of life. I think that's the gift God wants to give us.

When Mary and Elizabeth got those gifts, they didn’t have to go shopping. Instead they had to be still and quiet. They had to listen to the voices that no one else could hear; voices that were telling them impossible things and each of them had to believe that God would do just what God promised - even to them, just as they were – even to us – just as we. All we have to do is listen, believe, and trust that what the Lord says is so... ..You know, children have an easy time at trusting – at believing. We adults seem to get “smarter” with age and learn to question and disbelieve. As adults it requires a special vision, and a special discipline to see signs of hope and to discover cause for joy. In our world and in our lives, it takes eyes that trust and hearts that believe to find real reasons to sing, to magnify the Lord, to give thanks. But if we are to discover what this season is all about, it has to be done.

Perhaps the lessons from Mary and Elizabeth about our Christmas season is that the hope and joy which the world outside is trying to create, or to pretend, or to buy, this month, really isn’t for sale. It is a gift - a gift usually given quietly in the places we least expect it, in the ways we do not believe possible.

The real business of these last hours before Christmas is waiting, and listening, and trusting that the Lord will regard our low estate, and will give to us what the world can neither give nor recognize. And

perhaps, as happened to Mary and Elizabeth, some new life will begin to grow within us, new life that can begin once more to transform us; and, through us, to renew our world.

(Fr Lee and I will disagree theologically whether Mary actually Knew about how her life would be forever changed, but I don't think that either Mary or Elizabeth knew who or what they would become when they listened to God. They simply had faith to listen and to act.

What jumped out at me in the Gospel was, first of all, the words Elizabeth said to her cousin Mary – the words to the “Hail Mary” Prayer recited regularly by the Roman Catholics... “Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb”.

The words that Mary sang – known as the Magnificat – are also spoken clearly in our Gospel today. My *soul* magnifies the Lord and my *spirit* rejoices in God my Savior. Whew how deep is that love of God? It goes to her very being – and all she had to do was listen...and trust.

Beginning on Friday night and for the next couple weeks of the Christmas season as we Episcopalians continue to celebrate the birth of Jesus, our Lord, listen to the music, I urge you to feel that love of God – to let your soul magnify the Lord – to let your spirit rejoice in God our Savior- our Emmanuel. Feel that love to the very core of your being. Sing – rejoice – be loud – be off key, sing like nobody is listening. But today - Today – be still – listen- and know God. Amen

For Communion, hold your palms upward and the bread will be placed there. It is helpful if you guide the cup to your mouth. If you wish to receive the bread dipped in the wine, leave the bread in the palm of your hand and the chalice bearer will dip it for you.


