Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. 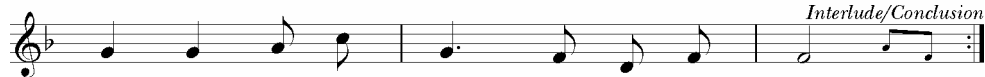

Holy Gospel

John 2:1-11

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

The Sermon

The Reverend Bert Bibens

Isaiah's words tell us that we are to "be a crown of beauty in the hand of the Lord." This puffs us up just a bit, because all of us are pretty convinced that we should be treated like Kings and Queens. We like that idea of people cooking our favorite foods, making fancy clothes for us, and making our beds every morning. It also appeals to us, thinking of people calling us sir, or ma'am, or your highness. Plus, they'd have to listen to us, and agree with us, even if we were wrong!

We are also drawn to the notion of being considered wise. One of my students recently announced to a class full of surprised peers, "I am wise. I'm the wisest person I know!" I can attest, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that this young person isn't nearly as clever or deep, as they might think. But, it's a general rule of thumb that those who think they are wise, and know all the answers, usually don't even know all the questions!

But, there is more to being royalty than just knowing all the answers, pushing others around, and lording over them...the monarchs that history is most kind to, are the ones that cared about their people, and sought to serve them.

Right here, in our own parish, we have lost some incredible souls to heaven, just in the last few weeks. Charles Evans, Donna Nichols and Fr. Jack Powers had attended Trinity for almost a century, collectively. But, way more important, than their longevity in this place, was the way they cared about others, shared their many gifts and talents, and helped build Trinity into the community that we all know and love. They all had servant's hearts, which means they cared as much about others, as they did themselves. And, isn't that one of Jesus' directives? To love your neighbor as yourself, help them when they're in trouble, and celebrate alongside when they are successful.

Charles, Donna and Jack were much beloved by all of us, because we were much beloved by them! They were kings and queens in the eyes of God, but when they looked at others, they saw royalty worth serving. They never forgot us...and we will never forget them.

Jesus is our ultimate King, and in today's story from the Gospel of John, we are reminded exactly how powerful our Lord and Savior really is. Jesus and his mother are in attendance at a wedding celebration, and it becomes clear that there isn't enough wine for all of the wedding guests. Mary asks Jesus to do something to help, and without raising a hand, he turns several casks of water into wine, which stuns and amazes those who were standing nearby. But, Jesus' miracles are many and varied, as we read the gospel accounts.

The hungry are fed, the sick are healed and the dead raised.

I contend that God's miracles continue to this day...every time a new healthy baby is born, it seems miraculous to me. When the poor are able to scrape together sufficient funds to pay their bills, sometimes with the help of family or friends, I consider that a miracle.

When bitter enemies are able to become friends, I see a miracle in their midst.

When our attention turns to the Almighty, it doesn't require a vivid imagination to see God's generosity and inventiveness, in the Creation that surrounds us. In the intricacies of a butterfly's wing, the stunning beauty of a colorful wildflower field, and the complexity of the human brain, the miracles that surround us are innumerable and breathtaking!

In Psalm 36, we read the words "...in your light we see light." And it's so true. The light that God sheds on our existence is full of wonder and enchantment and power, and goodness and mercy and love. And even though we are crowned by God to be the leaders and organizers of this world, there is absolutely no doubt as to the One who gives life and bestows blessings and knows our names.

Years ago, there was a beautiful purple banner, that used to hang from the balcony, every year during the season of Advent. And, as we prepared our hearts for Christmas, and the coming of baby Jesus, these words faced us, as we walked out of church each Sunday morning: "Darkness is shattered by the birth of Christ!" That banner meant so much to me, that I have a framed photo of it that stares at me every day.

No matter how dark the world might become...no matter how badly people might be treating each other...no matter how many days are won by mistrust and hatred...no matter how many tragedies may occur...no matter how many jobs are lost, or meals missed...no matter how many times we might think that God has forgotten about us...our darkness is SHATTERED time and again, as God reaches out to us, and Jesus loves us (whether we deserve it or not), and the Holy Spirit fills us once again with hope and belief and warmth to face the days ahead.

We are intended to be kings and queens, but with servant's hearts. We look for heavenly miracles, in the midst of our everyday lives...

And we remember, always...always...that Darkness is shattered by the birth of Christ!
